### Why does our district need a referendum?

- Aging Facilities: In several areas, our facilities are inadequate and in need of significant repairs.
- ▶ **Program Limitations**: Students' curricular options at the high school are limited due to lack of instructional space and we have not removed any of the temporary classroom units that were put in place during the 2003 Referendum because they are still heavily utilized.
- **Protecting our Students & Faculty**: A substantial investment in school security improvements is needed in all of our schools.

**Year:** 2012

#### **Key Aspects of Project**

- Educational Improvements / Upgrades
  - New media center/library for middle school
  - Lockers
  - Team room
  - Band room seating

  - Technology Upgrades: network & infrastructure
- Energy Efficiency
  - Securing key elements of building envelopes such as roofs, windows & doors
  - Sensory Lighting




## Why focus on the arts?

- <u>High School Auditorium</u>: Poor acoustics, tile floor stage, no stage craft space, seats are in disrepair and accordion doors no longer operate. Space does not meet current fire code regulations?
- Record Student Enrollment: Over 250 or 34% of our high school students, 230 Briarcliff students or 73% and 145 Wildwood 4-5 graders or 68% are involved in vocal and instrumental band.
- <u>Performance Spaces</u>: We do not have enough spaces for all of our students groups to rehearse and perform.



#### A \$3million health & wellness center?

- Locker Rooms: The Briarcliff Locker Room which serves middle school physical education classes and high school teams is substandard and unsafe. This space can be repurposed for instructional space
- <u>Gymnasium Space</u>: During the winter months we do not have enough gym space to support our wrestling and basketball programs.
- Community Meeting Space: Borough Hall does not have adequate meeting space for community organizations.
- Snack Shack and Bathroom Facilities: The current shack does not have adequate food preparation facilities and the bathrooms need updating.



#### Didn't we just renovate the schools?

- ▶ 1987: District Referendum Total \$3,400,000. Extensive roofing, lighting, bathroom renovations, heating, ventilation and ADA compliance work \$7,127,190 in current dollars



























## What happens with these plans?

- Steering Committee will guide the process
- ♦ Community Survey & Public Meetings will determine most viable proposal to present to the public for a vote in April 2017
- Certain referendum projects will be presented for private, grant and corporate funding
- Prior to the vote in April 2017, the Board will determine exactly how much state funding will be available for this project

# Balancing the 2% Cap & Rising Costs: Revenue Generating Programs

- Currently the district accepts tuition students from:
  - Districts around the state who send their Deaf & Hard of Hearing students to Lake Drive
  - Boonton Township with whom we have a send/receive agreement
  - Tuition students from area towns who apply privately
- Referendum 2017 offers the premier programming Mountain Lakes students deserve and provides opportunities for controlled revenue generation:
  - Partnership for a Biotechnology Program
  - Arts School to Watch
  - Robotics, STEM and Maker spaces
